

January 16, 2022 SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Miracles in our Lives

As we step into the second week of the ordinary time, The universal church invites us to pay attention to the week of prayer for Christian unity $(18^{th} - 25^{th} \text{ January})$ observed every year. The theme for this year is "We saw the star in the East, and we came to worship Him" (Mt 2:2). The week of prayer will come to an end with the feast of conversion of St. Paul the Apostle on January 25th. Let's pray for unity among the Christians.

The gospel this weekend highlights the theme of wedding at Cana, A familiar text, the first miracle performed by Jesus (John 2: 1-11).

What is a miracle? A number of definitions and explanations are given by scientists and spiritual writers. Traditionally understood, a miracle is a supernatural sign or wonder, brought about by God, signifying His glory and the salvation of mankind. As a sign, a miracle is perceived by the senses and makes present the supernatural order, God's governance of nature, and His loving plan of salvation. Miracles are a call to faith.

Miracles are learning experiences for us. They point to something that God wants us to know or believe about Himself and His loving plan of salvation. If it is so, what do we learn from today's miracle, the wedding at Cana? Some of them are:

Lesson 01 – NOTHING IS IPOSSIBLE WITH GOD

Lesson 02 – GOD'S PRESENCE MAKES OUR LIFE COMPLETE

Lesson 03 - POWER OF MARY'S INTERCESSION

Miracles are still happening in our world today. We just need to be expectant and open to his power.

As per Brian Jones, there are two types of miracles,

- Instantaneous miracles and
- Perseverance miracles

As per him, instantaneous miracles are a kind of miracle where God supernaturally removes or resolves a problem, like when someone is physically ill and God removes the sickness. For him, these are "instantaneous miracles" because they happen in a moment's notice.

The second kind of miracle is the kind where God chooses not to supernaturally remove or resolve a problem. Instead, God gives his ongoing, miraculous strength to us to enable us to persevere through the problem. This kind of miracle happened routinely in the Bible and it still happens as frequently today. For him, these are "perseverance miracles" because the "miracles" do not occur instantly.

Let's be thankful to God for the miracles we experience in our life and others. Let those miracles be the source of strength in deepening our faith.

Victims come from any socioeconomic group, race, culture, religion, ethnic background or age. Nobody appears to be immune or safe. However, this is an issue that many Americans are unaware of. Every day, people are coerced, deceived and forced into being trafficked, even by those close to them. Human trafficking and exploitation thrive on secrecy, and can only be ended through awareness. There are 25 different types of trafficking within the United States. Examples are: Sex trafficking, forced labor, forced marriage, exploitative begging and pornography. Many are targeted online. They are groomed and coerced. If you think you have information about a trafficking situation, report it immediately. Anti -Trafficking Hotline Advocates are available 24/7 to take a report.
