

FROM OUR PASTOR

The words of Matthew Kelly in his book "Rediscover the Saints" came home to me in this time of change. He said the following. "Do you have powerful routines and rhythms that ground the days of your life in health, happiness, and holiness? I mention all three because I believe they are very strongly connected.

My whole life I have been fascinated with men and women who have been successful in any arena of human excellence. I have studied their lives and it always becomes quickly apparent that they each have their own 'rule of life.' They each have strong daily rituals and routines that allow their genius to flow and flourish. It's a powerful lesson--and even as I sit here writing, I know it is a lesson I need to learn again.

These days this lesson is ever present in the lives of my children. They thrive on routine. Disrupt that routine or take it away altogether and they are lost. When children's routines are disrupted they often misbehave, and it is easy to focus on this. But what they are really saying to us is that they are lost, that we have pulled the foundation of their days and weeks out from under them, and now they are confused and disoriented.

Saint Benedict understood the power of daily routines and rituals, and God collaborated with him to drive this wisdom deep into the life of the Church."

I added the underline to Matthew Kelly's words. I think it is not just children who are disoriented or confused. We as adults have to admit to that also. Yes, we are doing the best we can. The foundation seems to be moving all the time. We don't necessarily have a reference point or template to work off of. Nonetheless the daily challenge of caring from a distance or staying home is one that calls us to new ways of responding in love.

It is quite the Lent. Perhaps this is the time to live the virtues all the more; with ourselves, our families and anyone we come into contact with. It is a time to look at our routines at home. Is it chaos? What have we done with our routines? A meme I saw said "everyday is pajama day." What can we count on? What can our kids count on? Often children don't like rules or having to do something. But they can count on the rules and you can count on them not liking them. Yet for both they are means of giving orientation, direction and a foundation to our day and actions.

Going deeper, what about our prayer routines? What do we have in place for ourselves and our family to grow closer to Jesus? It is truly weird to have Sunday Mass by myself. But I am celebrating Mass everyday for you, the stated intention and the needs of all people at this time. What roots our daily prayer? What time with Jesus gives us that foundation to approach the day and all it holds with that sense of peace that only Jesus can give?

I see many comments on social media ending with "Stay safe" or "Stay well". I would add "Stay in prayer." May Jesus be the foundation and structure of your day so that you may grow in health, happiness and holiness.

The purpose of this examination is to gratefully recognize the hand of God in all aspects of daily life, and to ask for the grace to become aware of the ways we have responded to the Lord's grace today, where we have fallen short, to ask His forgiveness and to cooperate more fully with His grace as we receive His strength to resist sinful habits and avoid the possible occasions of sin in the future. Virtual Parish Mission for Holy Week and Easter

Most of the faithful will likely be unable to participate in the Holy Week and Triduum liturgies this year because of the restrictions resulting from the coronavirus outbreak. However, the good news is that these sacred events will still be celebrated locally and around the world. Jesus and his Paschal Mystery will be in our midst, and his saving grace will be available to us.

To help the faithful share in this grace, every day from Monday, March 30, through Thursday, April 2, Christopher Carstens will offer a Virtual Parish Mission that uncovers Easter's powerful mysteries. We will travel with Christ from Ash Wednesday through Palm Sunday and look especially at the Triduum's Mass of the Lord's Supper, Good Friday liturgy, and Easter Vigil.

In the course of this journey through the highpoint of the Church's sacred year, we will also consider what divine life in God looks like during the Easter season to Pentecost—and beyond.
