FROM OUR PASTOR

Happy Labor Day.

Labor Day is an annual holiday to celebrate the economic and social contributions of workers to the strength, prosperity, and well-being of the country. In the United States, Labor Day is a federal holiday observed on the first Monday of September.

In the United States, Labor Day is customarily viewed as the end of the summer vacation season.

Labor Day has its origins in the labor union movement, specifically the eight-hour day movement, which advocated eight hours for work, eight hours for recreation, and eight hours for rest. In the United States the first Labor Day holiday was celebrated on Tuesday, September 5, 1882, in New York City. The idea spread with the growth of labor organizations, and in 1885 Labor Day was celebrated in many industrial centers of the country. Oregon was the first state to make it a holiday on February 21, 1887. By the time it became a federal holiday in 1894, thirty states officially celebrated Labor Day.

It was celebrated in September and not on May 1 as in many other countries to fill the long gap between the 4th of July and Thanksgiving.

The above was taken from a Wiki site. Perhaps with a bit of humor we can look at this holiday that we take off of work to celebrate work. More seriously we consider the idea of 8 hours of work, recreation and rest. I am not sure how we are doing with such an ideal balance. The world of labor has changed a great deal since 1894. What we call work or a job or labor is very different. Our attitude to work also has changed. Who expects to have one job their whole entire life? Life expectancy was much lower for many reasons and the length of working very different.

The history of trade or labor unions is very different in the US and in Europe. Some of the fruits they have produced are taken for granted and considered standards we have assumed for many decades.

Cardinal Wyszynski wrote "Sanctify your daily life" in 1946. It is a great, deep and philosophical work that has the reader look at work in and of itself. It helps us go beyond an attitude of how we approach work. He ties it nicely with scripture and reminds us of our fallen nature and how work can be experienced as a burden. So I offer you a few take away thoughts I have come across in my reading (and I am only half way through the book).

**Prayer is work that many avoid as it is easier to do physical labor and not engage the body, mind and soul as prayer does. Work is not a good unto itself. It is not to lead to greed but possessions and private property are to lead us to charity. Work is one of the means of interior sanctification. Work and prayer are not opposed to each other. We are meant to give time to each, even praying when working; bringing God's grace into that moment. Sin can impact our work as social beings since we don't see the other or what they are doing in God's light. **

So enjoy your Labor Day with family and friends and be open to the blessings of your work.
