Dear Brothers and sisters in Christ,

We continue our Advent preparations for the birth of Christ. The current circumstances of the pandemic provide us with a wonderful opportunity! "What!?" you say. With the continuing restrictions on interacting with others, each of us can take time for more prayer in preparation for Christmas.

In my Bulletin note of November 15th I mentioned that so many things seem uncertain, that perhaps we should get back to the basics of our faith and that we ask God to walk the corridors of our hearts.

Many are suffering because of the normal challenges of our life, to say nothing of those difficulties being exasperated by the pandemic. We might feel weak in that suffering. St. Paul

gives us a perspective on our weakness that comes in suffering. In 2 Corinthians chapter 12 he says this:

"I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and constraints, for the sake of Christ; for when I am weak, then I am strong." At first glance we may see this as a contradiction. However upon closer inspection the truth of the paradox becomes apparent, that being that we must put our trust in God that "this too will pass." In that trust we overcome our weaknesses with hope.

Two weeks ago I noted in the bulletin that Jesus is our source of hope. That hope will lie in a manger in just a couple of weeks. Therefore let us pray prayers of hope that will overcome our suffering, fear and weakness; as our salvation will be found in a baby at Christmas.

There is much going on in the world of the Knights of Columbus. As I reviewed what topics would be covered in this issue, I started with 20 potential articles! That would probably have made this an 8-page newsletter. Instead, I'll summarize some points and leave it for council emails and our monthly council meeting to sort out the varied topics.



More changes are coming in the Knights. I just

received communication the first week of December that our meeting structure will be changing so as to streamline and modernize. Having reviewed those changes, it should not have a major impact on our council meeting. We'll discuss those changes at the December 15 meeting.

Noted on page 1 of this issue, our council turned 84 years old on December 6th, St. Nicholas Day. The council was just 5 years old the day before the attack on Pearl Harbor that brought the United States into World War II.

The council had what we hope will become an annual Memorial Mass for the deceased members of our council. During Mass we acknowledged those who passed away, by name, since 2010. Each name was followed by the simple word "absent" to acknowledge they are no longer with us. Next year the Memorial Mass will be on Tuesday November 2nd, at the 5:30pm Mass, also All Souls Day. We would like to more actively engage the widows of deceased brothers in our activities and make sure they know they are invited to attend next year's Memorial Mass. We will probably again look at those who have passed away in the previous decade. If we know a widow or family members will be attending that Memorial Mass we will also memorialize those names at the Mass. If you know of a widow of a deceased Knight please let me know so I can reach out to them by including them in our newsletter and in other ways as well.

On November 10th, our Knights council sponsored "How to Protect Your Family and Your Financial Future". We had our first Virtual and live meeting and it was conducted well. Thanks to our field agent Greg Helgerson for his help and that of the parish for hosting the event. Attorney Eric Johnson of our parish Finance Council talked about a number of legal considerations in providing financial protection for the family.

Family Compass— Fr. John Potaczek Family

Father John exemplifies the core Catholic family values of prayer, servitude, generosity and selflessness that guides St Patrick's everyday.



Father John grew up in the Chippewa Falls area graduating from McDonell High School and UW Eau Claire. He taught in South Korea, entered the seminary and was ordained a priest in 1999. He has served in parishes in La Crosse, Stevens Point, Bloomer and now Mauston. In his 3.5 years in Mauston where the parish, St Patrick, also has a grade school, Father has dealt with hiring 3 school principals and 1 global pandemic, while also dealing with his regular daily duties at the parish and school. The principal resigned just as the 2020-2021 school year was to start. Fr. John acted as interim principal until a temporary part-time principal was hired late October. That principal, working remotely lasted 3 weeks before having a severe case of COVID and resigning. Fr. John thus continues to act as the Principal. Through it all, Father John has led St Pats with patience, endurance and thoughtfulness, listening to others and making the best decisions he can for the spiritual well being for each and every one of his family of parishioners.

Fr. John is the council Chaplain attending most council meetings. He strongly supports the Knights of Columbus Council. He is a former Wisconsin State Chaplain of the Knights of Columbus.

No amount of words can begin to capture St Pat's gratitude for his tireless efforts in "fathering" our parish.

This column will be a monthly informal recording of Minutes of council meeting decisions/votes. The November Meeting minutes begin this reporting so members are aware in particular of council decisions made at meetings.

Minutes of the October 20, 2020 meeting were read and approved.

GK Steve Hesprich read a letter from General Agent

Tim Nowak praising Greg Helgerson as the agent of the month for the state of Wisconsin for his excellent work even during this time of Covid.

December 2, 2020 will be a virtual retirement income seminar by well know speaker Tom Hegna entitled "Don't Worry, Retire Happy." Members are encouraged to register and attend the virtual seminar with their wives if married. The seminar is 45 minutes with 15 minutes for questions. Tom gives a very provocative and different perspective on the subject of reliable retirement income. The council will get credit toward one of the Insurance requirements of Star Council if several members attend.

Father John reported on the parish silent auction. One of the things the parish had to do was register and pay an annual subscription to the web service that provided tools for the silent auction. Since all bidders had to provide a credit card, once the deadline came, credit cards of the winners could immediately be assessed and it made no work for the parish to collect monies. Since this service has been paid for a year's subscription, it could be used by the parish, possibly some of the affiliated groups, such as the Knights of Columbus.

Father John told us about an ecumenical service being hosted by St. Patrick on Wednesday November 25th. All parish members are invited to come. It begins at 7pm. Father asked if the Knights could provide ushers for the event. Steve Hesprich volunteered to be one. We need one other member to step forward.

Father read from the "Knights to Christ" book today's entry on Fraternity which focused on God's love for you.

Treasurer Jim Kolba reported we grossed \$673 from the "no-bake" pancake breakfast. Minus expenses, we had a net profit of \$625 for the 8th grade class.

Our liability insurance is \$315 for a year. A motion was made and seconded, and approved to pay that bill. The balance of the general fund is \$728 and the charity balance is \$2127.

Jim Kolba reported that the Bank of Mauston will match our \$400 donation to the food bank and probably other organizations and individuals up to whatever the bank budget is for helping the food pantry.

The Free Throw contest is in question because of COVID. We will wait to hear more about guidelines.

The St. Patrick school has a part time interim principal, Randall Stanke.

November 2, 2021, All Souls Day, will be the next Council Memorial Mass for deceased members of the council.

Dick and Matt Schwab indicated the Game Feed is still in planning in the fact gathering stage, a bit on hold till we learn more about how the Hunters' Night event dealt with the circumstances of COVID. It is likely it will be pushed out to February or March.

Tickets were distributed by Deputy Grand Knight Bill Powers on behalf of his dad Steven for the State Charity Raffle. For all other members, the tickets will be mailed.

The next council meeting is Dec. 15th, 6:30pm for the officers and directors, and 7pm for the business meeting.

Meeting was adjourned at 8:05pm.
