


The Council Compass—Family

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

Christ's Compass— 3-leaf Clover


Dear Brothers and sisters in Christ.

Family Online Service Auction

Our parish is undertaking a fund raising effort to help offset lower offertory monies this past year because of the pandemic. Our council will be giving leadership to an online service auction.

The Online Service Auction is not too dissimilar from the online silent auction we ran in the fall. It uses the same software to manage the auction – with two important differences:

- 1) The auction items with be volunteered service activities
- 2) The services to be auctioned would be family centered, that is, we would be encouraging families to provide the services to be in the service auction. This has several

implications:

- A. This could be a way to re-engage our families in the parish and in the community. There may be some ideas to get people back to church
- B. Build up community, families helping those who bid on services.
- C. We would certainly also allow and promote business services to be part of the service auction. So not only families, but with families being the focus. And we may also have actual items for auction, though this is not the focus
- D. We would have some hope that by July 1st, Covid masks would, for the most part, be a thing of the past. If they are, there's going to be an extraordinary energy to get out and do things (and it will likely be significant even if there is still a mask dictate, if last summer is any indication of how much people were out and about).

We need a strong theme to build energy and draw the community at large, and the parish families in particular, into helping others.

We would target the execution of the auction late-May to mid-June. We want it in this timeframe, to allow time to get it promoted and organized, and for its timing to coincide with summer vacations and the very likely overwhelming desire of people to get masks off, be outside and interact with others — and to have it fall within the current parish fiscal year which ends June 30th. The execution of services can be any time. Some ideas to be auctioned would be perhaps mowing lawns, shoveling sidewalks, or any number of other service projects for which a family can be involved.

As to the use of the proceeds, the parish will decide. However what originally motivated the idea was to raise additional monies for the parish which has, as all know, a precipitous drop in offertory this fiscal year.

We will discuss these ideas in more detail at our March 16th council meeting.

Even though the Knights would give leadership to this initiative, to be successful the service projects will require families, individuals and parish groups to be involved.

Hunters' Raffle & State Raffle

At our March council meeting we will be exploring doing a Hunter's Chili on the evening of our raffle drawing. We may possibly have brats too, Tuesday April 20th. That date we will have an (abbreviated) council meeting after the raffle drawing at 7pm. There will be no officer/director meeting.

We are also promoting the State Raffle. First prize is the winner's choice of a new Ford F150, second prize is a choice of a Harley or \$25,000, and 3rd through 100th prizes are \$500 each. An amount of each ticket sold comes back to our council to support our local charitable causes. Last year those efforts netted the council over \$1,000.

On both the March 20/21 and April 17/18 weekend Masses we will be putting baskets out with separate envelopes containing \$20 of raffle tickets for the Hunter's Raffle and the State Raffle. The Hunter's



Raffle has a flyer with the 3-ticket pak; the State Raffle has its flyer with four \$5 tickets. We just need a Knight after each of those Masses to be behind the table and answer any questions about either raffle.

For the second year our council is sponsoring a raffle of hunting weapons. Last year we raffled 3 rifles. This year will are providing two rifles and a crossbow, each with a scope. Tickets are \$10 each or 3 for \$20. The raffle benefits two causes: Our school's science program and the Westside School Clothing Closet. The drawing will take place at 7pm on Tuesday April 20, 2021 in Reardon Hall. All are welcome to attend. We will be providing refreshments and adhere to recommendations to wear a face mask, and social distancing. Tickets are available in the parish office or from any member of the Knights. Monies can be sent to or dropped off at the parish.

Compass Minutes—February Meeting

The meeting began at 6:59pm. After opening prayer and pledge the minutes of the January 19, 2021 meeting were approved as written. They were as previously emailed and [mostly] shown in the January/February 2021 newsletter.

Chaplain's report: Fr. John invited members to attend some events during Lent: Mondays, 2pm Rosary; After 5:30pm Mass on Tuesdays, Stations of the Cross; Thursday March 25th Communal Penance Service; This

Tuesday February 23rd, the Holy Happy Hour at 6:30pm at the State Street Tap.

Fr. John read from the "Knights to Christ" reading on Unity from the February 17th entry. The theme had to do with taking a risk to do something you believe in, even when it is not popular. The entry's story was about Abraham Lincoln's "House divided" speech. He asked for many opinions before delivering the speech, many saying it would be disastrous to deliver it. One said "Deliver that speech as read and it will make you President of the United States."


Grand Knight Report: The Semi-Annual audit is completed and was submitted February 14th; we may need to file an amended audit to fix a small technical issue (numbers themselves are fine). We should start thinking about nominations for council officers. March will be a normal meeting format; however April will be a very abbreviated meeting, possibly just 15 minutes, because of priority for the Hunter's Raffle drawing at 7pm. Only business we may conduct will be voting on the new bylaws should we have the needed quorum. Steve Hesprich and Randy Boehm will be our State Convention delegates. We would like to identify two alternates should an issue arise not allowing the identified delegates to serve. We will be attending the convention virtually, possibly from Reardon Hall (have to clear a potential conflict for use of Reardon Hall). [postnote: location will be the school library]

Treasurer's Report (given by Randy Boehm): We have \$918 in the general fund; \$2127 in the Charity Fund.

Membership Report: New members can join online, free through June 30, 2021 if they also then attend a virtual or live exemplification to receive their first through third degrees. The State Council will waive our approximately \$230+ per capita obligation for the April to September 2021 period if we add one new member. We did an exercise to look at some former members to see who might know and contact them as a reinstated member counts as a new member. There will be a live Estate Planning Fraternal Benefit event hosted by the Wisconsin Dells Council this Saturday, February 20th. Previously a flyer was sent to members with email to advise them. And we will be hosting a "watch party" for the Estate Planning Fraternal Benefits event being hosted by the General Agent, Tim Nowak, on Tuesday February 23rd. A Watch Party is basically inviting people to come together to view and participate in a virtual webinar. That will start at 6:45pm and simple refreshments will be provided. No RSVP is needed.

March 5th is the first Friday so adoration at St. Patrick's is from noon to 6pm. The Knights have the 4-5pm hour. Please join us, particularly now that we are in Lent. There will not be an April First Friday adoration because it falls on Good Friday when all Adoration chapels and times are closed.

Community Report by Randy Boehm: We had 20 participants in 12 of the 14 categories of competition. Randy has suggested that for the January 2022 competition we add a handicap competition. It will be the 50th anniversary of the Knights nationally sponsoring this youth event.



The Hunter Raffle will take place at our April 20th, meeting; drawing at 7pm (we will be starting that meeting most likely at 6:15 or 6:30pm so we have time to prepare for the raffle drawing). We would like to open this to family and friends who wish to be present for the drawing. We'll also provide some simple refreshments.

Fourth Degree Report: There will be a 4th degree virtual exemplification on Saturday May 15, 2021, cost is \$50. A flyer was previously emailed.

New business: the FFA will use our pancake maker on Tuesday February 23rd. They will pick it up February 19th. We lend it to them each year for their annual food event. Juneau County Courthouse will host a blood drive on Feb 19th from 10am-2pm in the County Board Room. Also at the Lodge, a blood drive will take place from noon to 5pm on February 23rd. for any member who would like to donate blood.

We discussed the idea, that has been presented to a couple of the parish organizations (Pastoral Council and Finance Council) of a Silent Auction with a focus on family service projects being the items auctioned. This will have a final presentation to the PAT (Parish Action Team) on March 9th. The Knights will give leadership to this event but widely involve the parish and area communities including businesses. It won't be limited to services offered by families such as perhaps mowing lawns, shoveling sidewalks and driveways, etc.; but also may include items for bidding including perhaps gift cards). The event would raise money for use as directed by the parish, and more importantly look to heavily engage families to return to church and build community as we come out of this COVID crisis, hopefully this summer when everyone will be anxious again to be outdoors, and return to venues and restaurants currently restricted in use.
