

Brother Knights, families, and friends,

We just had the drawing for our 3rd annual Sportsmen’s Raffle at our April 19th council meeting. Congratulations to the winners! The proceeds from the raffle will benefit local charities. The causes will be decided at our May 10th council meeting. We decided at our April 19th meeting on the distribution of funds from last year’s State Charities Raffle. We raised \$1910 from that raffle. We voted to give \$1,000 to the Supreme Council sponsored Ukraine Humanitarian Fund and \$410 to the St. Benedict Fund of our parish. Previously \$500 went to a seminarian we support, Jared Clements (see his thank you on page 3).



Over **\$13.4 million has been raised** as of 4/21/22 to provide humanitarian aid to Ukraine. 

Intellectual Disabilities Drive

On the weekend of April 29, 30 and May 1, at three locations we will be conducting our annual Tootsie Roll drive. This time we will be at St. Patrick for the weekend Masses, as well as Festival and the Mauston Bank Friday through Sunday.

For decades the Knights around the country have conducted this program to benefit those with intellectual



disabilities. It works simply—we give Tootsie Rolls away and people donate a buck or two, or five, ten or twenty dollars. This is a program best conducted with the entire family. Young children in particular enjoy helping to give away candy and they also seem to elicit greater giving from those who receive the sweet delight.

When you receive a call to help, usually for two-hour times, be generous with your time and make sure it is with your family helping as well. Once we conclude the weekend of Tootsie give-aways, and we meet in May, we'll decide which intellectual disability causes we will support. Throughout the State of Wisconsin collectively it is likely that an amount in excess of \$600,000 will be collected to benefit those supported by this cause.

Minutes of recent council meetings

Recent issues of the newsletter have been bi-monthly and with the timing, we have three council meeting minutes to present here,

February 15, 2022 Minutes

The meeting began at 6:59 pm. After opening prayer and pledge the minutes of the January 18, 2022 meeting were read and approved.

Chaplain's Report: Knights to Christ entry focus was on Unity. Taking a risk for something you believe in. Our families face dilemmas. We must seek Jesus to help us through difficult times.

Grand Knight Report: Annual Fraternal survey was submitted 1/31/2022. We have met our Membership numbers for Star Council prior to 12/31/2021 so our April State Per Capita for April 2022 will be waived (assuming we are still at the membership quota by 6/30/2022). Discussed the new Affiliate Membership. GK and FS will review the roster and see who has not paid dues for 2 years who may be candidates for this new membership category.

Treasurer's Report: General Fund balance is \$1,977.29 and the Charity Fund balance is \$2,337.02.

Calendar: Ash Wednesday is March 2nd. The District Free Throw Contest is Feb 27, 2022. Our final pancake breakfast, to benefit the 5th grade class has been moved to Sunday March 6th. Sportsman's Raffle: the guns are not in yet. Winners have an option to take \$500 instead of the gun or bow. March for Life was held Jan 23rd at the Juneau County Courthouse. Our council participated including family members. There is a Fraternal Benefit Night February 28, 2022 at 7pm which will be virtual. We are doing a "Watch party" in Reardon Hall.

A \$143 bill was received for medals for the Free Throw Contest participants. Steve Hesprich (GK) and Randy Boehm (PGK) will be the council delegates to the State Convention on May 6th, taking place at Chula Vista in Wisconsin Dells. From the first 3 pancake breakfasts we made 316, 438 and 263 for the 8th, 7th, and 6th grade classes respectively. Brett Kurdick donates toward the pancake breakfasts.

Randy Boehm's granddaughter Emma is home now from the hospital. Pray for Marie Boehm, widow of deceased Knight Gerry Boehm who may need to move to assisted living or with a family member.

We received a summary of the new boiler replacement project (roughly \$1,075,000) which has already been funded (not necessary to do capital campaign. Meeting adjourned after 8 pm.

March 15, 2022 Minutes

The meeting began at 7:04 pm. After opening prayer and pledge the minutes of the February 15, 2022 meeting were approved as written.

Chaplain's report: excused. We read the March 15th entry from Knights to Christ: Charity is learning from a childhood memory.

Communication: received thank you card from Jared Clements, the seminarian we supported recently with a \$500 check (RSVP program of the Knights).

Treasurer Report: General Fund balance is \$3,026.68 and the Charity Fund balance is \$2,337.02.

Membership Report: 3 handouts – exemplification being hosted by the Hillsboro council at St. Aloysius church after their 10am program. Mentioned two council members who have been moved to the new Affiliate membership. Reminded members of upcoming Lenten Parish events. Diocesan Free Throw contest will be March 27th in Marshfield. 10 of the 11 age groups advancing are from our council's Free Throw. One of those indicated a conflict, so 9 from are council are expected to

compete in the Diocesan contest.

Sportsman Raffle drawing will be at our next council meeting at 7:30pm. We've collected roughly \$2,000 to date (will cover expenses of \$1,500 for prizes and a bit for expenses). We started a discussion of how to spend last year's State Raffle proceeds of roughly \$1,900. Need to decide at the April 19th council meeting. The St. Benedict's fund was one mentioned as a possible recipient.

4th Degree exemplification will take place on May 21st in Eau Claire, Steve Hesprich has information for those who would like to join. Kevin Quist is planning to become a 4th degree member then. A Fraternal Benefits seminar will be conducted on Monday March 28th. It will be focused on Estate Planning. It will be a virtual seminar. We will not have a watch party unless there is demand.

Financial Secretary: some monies turned over to Treasurer. Thanked those Knights who prayed for his granddaughter Emma who is now doing well and home. 38 members have paid their dues to date.

Nominations for officers will be presented at the April 19th meeting. Steve will work with the trustees to gather a slate of officers. rayer Requests: in Thanksgiving for Randy Boehm's granddaughter Emma, with her improving health. Meeting adjourned at 7:40 pm.

April 19, 2022 Minutes

Meeting was called to order at 7 pm. Minutes of the March 15th meeting were approved as published (here).

3 of the 9 Free Throw contestants at the Diocesan contest will be advancing to the State competition on Saturday April 30, 2022.

Treasurer's Report: General Fund balance is \$5,995.95, the Charity Fund balance is \$2,337.02. The pancake breakfast March 6th benefiting the 5th grade class had a profit of \$484.37.

The Tootsie Roll weekend will be April 29 to May 1. Jon Field will be calling members to ask them to take 2-hour time slots at 3 locations, Parish (after weekend Masses), Festival, and the Mauston Bank.

Field Agent report: Greg Helgersen talked about the April 28, 2022 at 7pm Fraternal Benefit webinar. He is providing two Kiosks with 15 copies of each of 15 different booklets. One will be for St. Patrick's and the other will be placed at St. Mary's in Lyndon Station. Greg is donating those, but it will be the council's responsibility to restock books as needed. He also talked about membership. He handed out a small business card size tool that talks about what the knights are about.

Financial Secretary Report: Dues of \$104.45 collected.

Candidates for the 2022-2023 fraternal year were presented [see page 6 of the newsletter for details]. A motion was made for the remaining \$1410 of last year's State Raffle proceeds to donate \$1,000 to the Knights Ukrainian Humanitarian Relief fund, and \$410 to the parish Benedict Fund. We did the Raffle drawing and contacted the three winners [see page 5 of the newsletter for details]. Gross proceeds for the raffle are \$4210.

Meeting was adjourned at 7:40 pm.

The Compass of Charity—Ukraine

The world's cry because of injustice, war and suffering upon the people of Ukraine is beyond most of our comprehension. Within days of the conflict's beginning in late February, 2022, the Knights sprung into action and began a fund raising effort for humanitarian aid. With over 1500 Knights in Ukraine and many more in Poland, the effort to leverage the contributions of Knights from around the world began.

This is what we do, to help those in the greatest need. One of the efforts during the weeks leading up to Easter was to start a drive for 10,000 Easter baskets for Ukrainian refugees in Poland. The Knights there have multiple staging locations where for \$50 a basket, contributors can provide one of these baskets of food and other essential material. The Supreme Knight, Patrick Kelly, along with his family symbolically presented one of these baskets on the Monday of Holy Week to Pope Francis to demonstrate the charitable work of the Knights. Anyone can make a financial donation, with 100% of the tax deductible money, going directly to this cause.

In addition to the assistance of councils in Poland, aid from the Knights is also assisting the Latin and Greek Catholic Churches in Ukraine to provide temporary shelter, food, medical supplies, clothing and communications.

Not only did the Supreme Knight visit the Holy Father, he also travelled to Poland to visit with Knights serving refugees and helped load the Easter care packages onto the latest "K of C Charity Convoy" of trucks bringing supplies into Ukraine. He then went into Ukraine to deliver additional Easter care packages to families taking refuge at a 14th-century monastery in Rava Ruska, in the Archdiocese of Lviv, Ukraine.

Leaders are the Compass of our Council

By Nominating Committee (Grand Knight and Trustees)

Each year we elect new council leaders for the Solomon Juneau Council 2770. The start of the fraternal year often brings new faces to the leadership in our council. Whether you got elected to an officer role for the first time, have been re-elected and need a refresher, or might be willing to consider taking an open position, here is a guide to our leadership team of Knights. We would add that it would be great to have more than one candidate for any given position.

Grand Knight

- Presides over all meetings.
- Appoints council chaplain, program and membership directors, and committees. Countersigns checks and orders for payment.
- Monitors council progress towards earning Star Council Award.
- Ensures all council forms and reports are submitted in a timely manner.
- Conducts the council semi-annual audit.

Deputy Grand Knight

- Assists the grand knight with operation of the council and any other duties assigned to him by the grand knight, presides at council meetings in the absence of the grand knight, and often serves on the council's Retention Committee.

Chancellor

- Responsible for encouraging members' participation in council programs, assists the grand knight and deputy grand knight with their duties and often serves on the council's Admission Committee.

Treasurer

- Responsible for handling council funds.
- Receives money from financial secretary and deposits it in the proper council accounts.
- Responsible for paying all council expenses.

Advocate

- Acts as parliamentarian for the council.
- Should have a working knowledge of Robert's Rules of Order, Charter, Constitution & Laws, and council by-laws.
- Responsible for seeking legal assistance from the state advocate when necessary.

Warden

- Responsible for supervising and maintaining all council property.
- Prepares council chambers for meetings and degree exemplifications.
- Oversees inside and outside guards.

Inside and Outside Guards

- Attends the doors of the council chamber, checks current membership cards and allows entrance and assists the warden with his responsibilities.

Board of Trustees

- Supervises all financial business of the council and conducts semiannual audits.
- Serves on the Nominating Committee to help invite and qualify candidates for office each year.

Our Election of officers will take place at our May 10, 2022 council meeting. To be a candidate a member needs to be a 3rd degree knight. With the recent changes to our ceremonials, all new members since the beginning of 2020 are third degree members.

We have three positions for which we do not have a candidate shown in red in the chart following. Of these, we especially need a 3rd Year Trustee. The Order normally wants an experienced past officer of the council to be a candidate for this position. For the elected positions a member can hold only one office at a time.

If you are uncertain of the time commitment, the Inside Guard has no practical duties but to be present at those meetings he is able to attend. The Warden's position is also with but a very small time commitment, less than an hour a month.



It's about the size of a business card, folded and the inside contains a wonderful "elevator speech" of who Knights are and what we do. Next time you see me, ask for one.
