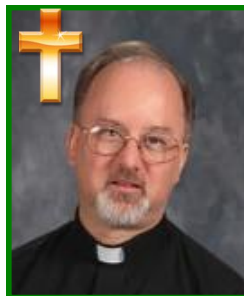

Christ's Compass— Corpus Christi & Fathers

One of the really great things about the Knights of Columbus is how in recent years the Order has put an extraordinary emphasis on the Eucharist. It has now become integral to the Knights' ceremonies teaching the principles we hold dear. The principles of Charity, Unity and Fraternity have been combined into one ceremony with the Eucharist's importance being prominent. Early in the ceremony this is clearly stated: "For *Knights of Columbus* these principles [Charity, Unity and Fraternity] find their origin and meaning in the Holy Eucharist." No Solemnity in the Church better celebrates the Eucharist than the Solemnity of Corpus Christi, the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ.



What is also very important to the Knights is *family* with an exclamation point on *fatherhood*. It is rare that both Corpus Christi and Father's Day are celebrated on the same day, maybe once every 9-10 years. When we look at the relationship of the Eucharist with the role of the father in the family, we see what is called the domestic church. This means that the Eucharist and our faith are integral to the family and especially through the example of a father's leadership. The Knights help men to live out a life of faith in the family. One often sees charity, the main principle of the Knights, as *love*. Knights have a tremendous love for their family of course, as do all, but they also have love for mankind, especially through the charitable works of the Knights in the local community and supporting family values. Families are under tremendous attack in our culture. The Knights are here to speak, pray, and act on behalf of traditional family values.

On the solemnity of Corpus Christi and of Father's Day, consider how you could be part of this dual celebration. Join us on Sunday June 19th for our Eucharistic procession from Church after the 10 am Mass and thank your fathers in our parish by inviting them become a member of the Knights of Columbus.

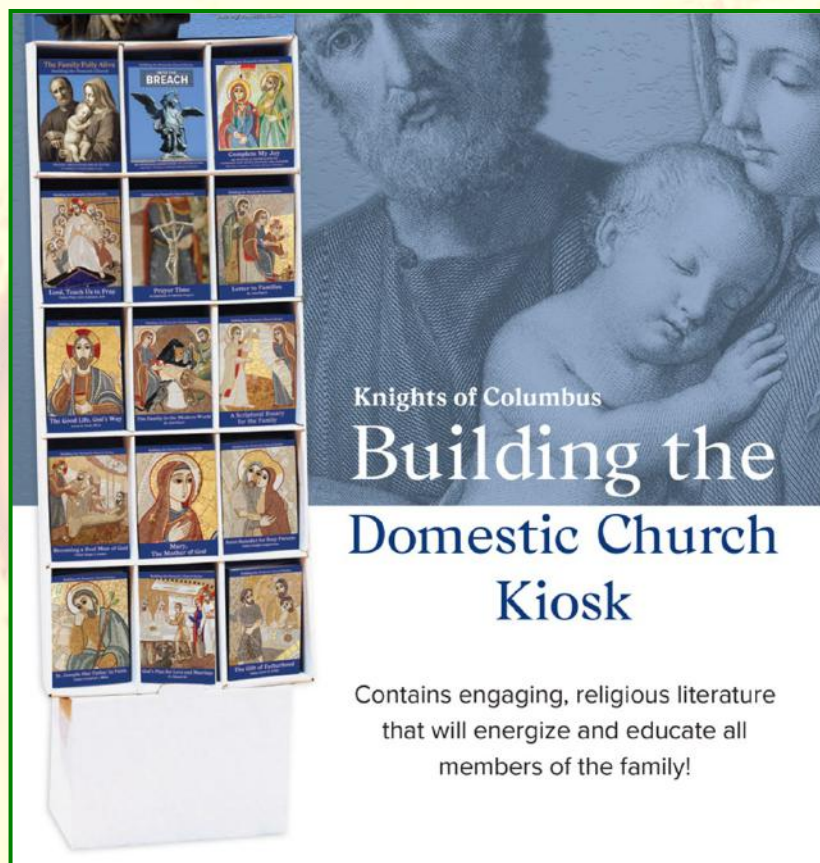

We have arrived at the end of the fraternal year. And with the help of our council members we have achieved a year of helping others. We were recently notified by the home office that our council has earned the STAR Council award, the most significant award a council can receive!

The Star council award is earned by achieving specified results in programs conducted, insurance promotion, and membership growth, along with taking care of certain administrative requirements including being 'safe environment' trained to work with youth, and a number of reporting submissions. Sometime in the fall we will receive a plaque commemorating the achievement. The legacy of a council however is not its awards but rather the heartfelt work it does for our families, parish, and community. That is something we can find great satisfaction, especially for working these past two years through a pandemic. This year we donated internationally to the relief efforts of Ukraine sponsored by the Knights and councils it has in Poland and Ukraine in the amount of \$1,000. As of 6/9/2022, the Knights internationally raised \$17,307,474. Our Intellectual Disabilities Tootsie Roll drive netted

On the weekend of April 29, 30 and May 1, at three locations we conducted our annual Intellectual Disabilities "Tootsie Roll" drive. We had Knights stationed at St. Patrick for the weekend Masses, as well as Festival and the Mauston Bank Friday and Saturday.

For decades the Knights around the country have conducted this

program to benefit those with intellectual disabilities. It works simply—we give Tootsie Rolls away and people donate a buck or two, or five, ten or twenty dollars.



We got a wonderful response from Knights who volunteered their time to hand out Tootsie Rolls. That in turn contributed tremendously to the results we experienced. Once we conclude the weekend of Tootsie giveaways, and we meet in May, we'll decide which intellectual disability causes we will support. Throughout the State of Wisconsin collectively it is likely that an amount in excess of \$600,000 will be collected to benefit those supported by this cause.

State Convention Gives Direction

There were a few delegates who attended remotely but the vast majority attended in person. One thing the pandemic taught us was how to hold a more effective condensed meeting. The entire business portion of the convention was conducted within 3 hours. That included handing resolutions, hearing the reports of the State Deputy and others, as well as conducting elections.

There were two sets of elections, that of state officers for the ensuing fraternal year, and the selection of delegates for the Supreme Convention

held always starting the first Tuesday of August.

Newly elected state officers were as follows: Michael Tennes and Don Schoenherr were re-elected to Warden and Advocate respectively. Miles

Casey and John Huttenhoff both advanced to State Secretary and State Deputy respectively. Corey Coonen automatically becomes the Immediate Past State Deputy. The new State Deputy, John, will appoint a State Chaplain. State Treasurer will be Roland Breunig, currently District Deputy 50 and a member of the State Investment Review Committee.

Minutes

The May 10, 2022 council meeting began at 7:08 pm. Minutes of the April 19, 2022 meeting were approved. Randy and Steve attended the State Convention and reported some of the experiences including election of state officers, and the selection of delegates to the Supreme Convention. Treasurer's report: The General Fund has a balance of \$5,901.40. The Charity Fund is at \$937.02. We had a net profit of \$1794 from the Sportsman's Raffle. The membership present recommend \$1,000 go to St. Patrick's language Arts Program and \$800 be donated to the Mauston High School Clothing Closet.

Our Council has achieved Star Council Status, at least according to our records. We await official recognition. Our Intellectual Disabilities (Tootsie Roll) drive collected \$2,852.22. Expenses were \$57.05 for a net of \$2,795.22. State will get \$698.81 of that and \$2,096 goes to our council for our charities. We have 3 Knights who will be attending the May 21st 4th Degree Exemplification in Eau Claire: Kevin Quist, Dick and Matt Schwab. Meeting was adjourned at 8:06 pm.

Compass of God and Country

In the last issue of **Knight's Compass** I answered the question "Is Patriotism our Country's Compass?" The conclusion of that piece was that love of God was missing from my early perspective of the 4th degree's principle of patriotism. In this issue, let's dig a little deeper into the notion of God and Country, that, love of both are inseparable in the Catholic understanding of patriotism.

I was vividly reminded of this reality, recently attending my first 4th degree exemplification in several years as a member of the honor guard just this past month (since organizing such an exemplification in 2017 while a Knight in Iowa). The exemplification is designed to instruct us about our nation's founding and even more than that the rich heritage of Catholicism from the founding of the Western Hemisphere, through times of our own lives. If someone didn't appreciate the essential role that Catholics have played in our nations' history, they will know after attending the exemplification of Patriotism. The love of God through the faith filled, bold actions of our Catholic forefathers makes the central tenant of love apparent.

We have a love of our country because the many freedoms we enjoy are the hallmark of our republic. We have all heard the expression that freedom is not free. Freedom has been possible because of the spilt blood of men and women throughout our history. Love engenders courage. Love causes us to do things for others, we wouldn't do for ourself. When that love is founded upon the love of our creator, in addition to the love of protecting our freedoms which secures the welfare of our families, we see that much good is possible in sacrifice.

So when I come back to why I am a fourth degree knight, I'm reminded of love. One further thing has become apparent to me as I've learned more about the global presence of the 4th degree. Not all 4th degree knights are American. They are Canadian, Mexican, Pilipino, Polish and Ukrainian, and many others. It is love of the same God, yes, and it is the love of their own country that makes them patriotic. The notion of patriotism is not a competitive patriotism between countries. If people love God and they love their own country, there is a peaceful cohesive understanding of love.

At the 2017 Supreme Convention the Knights introduced the new uniform of the 4th degree honor guard, replacing the traditional regalia. It was a very controversial time for the 2-3 years following that change. So many of the members cherished the regalia. What many don't realize is that the regalia was different in some countries outside of the United States. The new uniform was introduced, in part, to create a look that was consistent across countries. We are one Order, across the globe, emphasizing our commonality in the uniform of the fourth degree.

So when all is said and done, the fourth degree is *love* of peace and of all mankind, made in the image and likeness of God.

Emblem of the Patriotic Degree

The triad emblem of the Fourth Degree features the dove, the cross and the globe. The dove, classic symbol of the Holy Spirit and peace, is shown hovering over the orb of the Earth (globe). Both are mounted on a variation of the Crusader's cross, which was found on the tunics and capes of the Crusading knights who battled to regain the Holy Land from the pagans.



Spiritually, the sacred symbols on the emblem typify the union of the Three Divine Persons in one Godhead, the most Blessed Trinity.

The Globe – God the Father, Creator of the Universe.

The Cross – God the Son, Redeemer of Mankind.

The Dove – God the Holy Spirit, Sanctifier of Humanity.

The colors of the symbols are:

A blue globe with the land of the Western Hemisphere in white.

A red cross with gold borders and gold knobs at the end of the points forming the ends of the arms of the cross, also known as the Isabella cross.

A white dove.

Red, white and blue are the colors of the flag of the country in which the Knights originated. They are used to stress patriotism, the basic principle of the Fourth Degree.

Confirmation at St. Patrick's

Three Become Fourth

On May 21, 2022, three members of our council became 4th degree Knights of Columbus members. Father and son, Dick and Matt Schwab, and Deputy Grand Knight elect, Kevin Quist, became part of the patriotic degree of the Knights in an exemplification in Eau Claire. The ceremony was held in the church of the Immaculate Conception on May 21st. Matt told us that is the church he and Laura were married.



The 4th degree teaches us about the patriotic history of Catholicism in the United States. Many would have little clue as to how incredibly significant that impact has been on present day United States. We learned about the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence. There is much pomp and circumstance in this exemplification. Required attire is suit and tie.

Unlike the exemplification for the first three principles, the 4th degree is still a closed ceremony. A fourth degree member earns the title "Sir Knight".

Historically our council has not had an active involvement in the 4th degree. Only four of our members were

council/assembly officer name comparisons). He is responsible for running of color or honor guard events. There's an entire manual called the "Color Corps Drill Manual" that details the protocol for how color or honor guards perform.

Honor Guards are present at church related events, wakes, burials, watches, escorting dignitaries, laying a cornerstone, church dedications, etc. Color Guards are used to carry and accompany flag ceremonies.

The second point mentioned is that the Assembly is a sub-organization of the Knights of Columbus. That means the assembly operates independently of the council. They can at times do cooperative activities however. As the council does programs, has membership building, and promotes the insurance programs of the Order, so does the assembly. The nature of programs is normally along patriotic lines, though they often have for example, pro-life and charitable activities as does the council. The flag is a particularly attentive part of the fourth degree.

The second point mentioned is that the organization of the assembly is similar to that of the council. There are officers and directors. Some are appointed, some elected:

A person can be a member of any assembly, and normally an assembly consists of 4th degree members from multiple councils. We are members of the Fr. Francis Heindl Assembly 1902 based out of Tomah.

I hope this gives you a better sense of the organization of the Patriotic Degree.

What is the Assembly Organization?

I was a 3rd degree member for 17 months before becoming a 4th degree member. Other than knowing the purpose of the 4th degree was patriotism and they wore something called regalia with colored feather hats, capes, and carried a sword, I knew nothing else. If I had known more, I would have joined sooner.

There are 3 important points about the fourth degree *organization* that we should know and there are points to help us understand what the organization *does*.

First, the 4th degree consists of a sub-organization of the Knights of Columbus called an Assembly (counterpart to a council).

Second, the Assembly has a fairly similar organization structure to the council. It has mostly parallel officer and appointed positions to that of the council though many of the officer titles are named differently.

Third, the distinguishing part of the assembly is the Color Corps. This is the visible group that provides ceremonial service to civil, council or Church events. Let's talk about the Color Corps first.¹

There are two distinctive elements of the Color Corps—Honor Guard and Color Guard. What's the difference you ask? It's simple but not apparent.

A Color Corp Commander is an appointed position by the person who runs the assembly—the Faithful Navigator (see chart following on

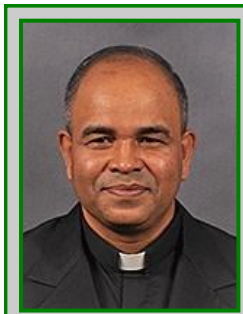
these involvements to explicitly limit the amount of time commitment by identifying just 2 or 3 activities throughout the fraternal year. The key in any director role is to have others do at least small parts with particular activities and lessen the load on any one individual. Each area has a number of established programs created by Supreme with very concrete steps for effectively conducting programs. And councils are completely free to do initiatives of their own provided council membership and leadership agrees, and where needed, approval by the pastor.
