

Compass of Life—Small is Big (and alive!)

'Small is big' has many meanings—a *small* Knights of Columbus council of fewer than 50 members, in a *small* town of fewer than 1,500 residents, raised a *big* amount of money, over \$30,000, to fund an ultrasound machine that will save the lives of *small* babies in the womb, all of whom will lead *big* lives.

On Friday, December 10th four Knights from three of the councils in District 20, braved the first significant snowfall of the season to travel to Madison to meet the

Director of the Women's Care Center, Olivia Grobbel, and to see the newly installed Ultrasound purchased through the efforts of the Fr. Cyril J. Smetana Council 9070 of Hillsboro, with help from others including our own council in Mauston.

The mission of the Women's Care Center is "to help pregnant women from our communities choose life for their babies, have healthier pregnancies, become better parents and take first steps to self-sufficiency."

It is where the 'small' babies in the womb are regarded as a gigantic gift from God.

The Hillsboro council is this *small* council that was able to raise not only the needed \$21,500 to fund an ultrasound machine, but even more pledges of \$30,000 - in the span of a few weeks. The monies needed to purchase an ultrasound is more than \$42,000. The remaining financial gift came through the matching funds program of the Knights of Columbus to the tune of about \$21,000. And you want to talk about a *big* program, this matching funds program has supported the purchase of over 1,500 ultrasound machines!

Dick Urban, Past Grand Knight of the Hillsboro council led the

charge. He would tell you the idea loomed BIG, as it was being considered. Once the decision was made to raise the monies, it was, well, an even bigger looking goal. A committee was formed to help raise the needed monies. Then, as they say, things quickly started happening and many stepped forward to contribute. In a few short weeks the needed monies were not only raised, but more support continued to pour in. All this says is 'small' is really 'BIG'!

We see that 14 different men served as Grand Knights during our second 25 years of existence. They saw us through the years of the Vietnam War and the egregious Supreme Court decision of Roe v. Wade that very poorly inferred that the 14th Amendment protected abortion as a fundamental right. We also saw the Vatican II council in the early to mid-1960s bring significant change to many Catholic practices. John F. Kennedy, a 4th degree Knight of Columbus, was assassinated.

Our 50th year anniversary was celebrated in 1986. Frederick Witcraft (GK 1985-1988) led that celebration.

We continue to look for photos of past grand knights, with the help of Jeri Kolba. We will continue to reveal the history of our Grand Knights in the next issue of

Knight's Compass. We hope these presentations of our history will help all members, and those others who read about our history, see the strong presence of our council leading up to the current time. 


On The track team, the four members of the relay team stayed after practice, and even practiced on weekends to refine their baton handoffs which are the key to a fast overall time.

The Eucharistic is the Ultimate Compass

This past June, the Feast of Corpus Christi, celebrated June 19 in the United States, marked the beginning of a multiyear initiative by the U.S. bishops to renew the Church by inviting the faithful into a living relationship with Jesus Christ in the Blessed Sacrament.

The *National Eucharistic Revival*, as the initiative is called, will include diocesan and parish-based formation and, following a National Eucharistic Congress to be held July 2024 in Indianapolis, will culminate in a "Year of Going Out on Mission." This year the focus has been on Diocesan initiatives, designed to be carried to the parishes.

In his annual report at the 139th Supreme Convention in August 2021, Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly announced that the Knights of Columbus would be a major sponsor of the revival. He also called on members of the Order to be ready to assist their bishops and pastors as true "Knights of the Eucharist".

"The Church teaches us that the Eucharist is the 'source and summit of the Christian life.' It is just as much the source and summit in the life of a Knight," the Supreme Knight said. "Working with our bishops and priests, we will strive to renew belief in the Eucharist and build up the Church. We are a force for unity, and we will prove it by pointing to the source of unity."

The Eucharist is the pinnacle of our Catholic faith.

The Diocese of La Crosse had a day of recollection for parish leaders and Knights of Columbus. Steve Hesprich represented St. Patrick and the Mauston Knights. Through presentations and break-out sessions, ideas were gathered as to how parishes could engage parish members to appreciate more strongly, the true presence of Christ in the Eucharist.

At our December 2022 council meeting we showed a short video entitled "Our Lady of Guadalupe, Woman of the Eucharist" to begin a series of short videos at our council meetings to reinforce the central importance of the Eucharist in the life of a Catholic, and certainly then, for all Knights. At our February 2023 meeting we asked members to watch for the strong connection that the exemplification video makes in regards to the importance of the Eucharist. Also at that meeting we showed a video entitled "The Veil Removed" (https:// www.youtube.com/watch?v=fGAYW-mtJWM) which is a dramatization of what really happens in regard to both the Mass and the Eucharist. We will look to show short videos and/or reflections on the Eucharist at upcoming meetings.
