In June we entered the 2nd year of the Eucharistic Revival, focused on the parish. The first year had a diocesan focus. The 3-year program, directed by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), is designed to put

a strong focus on the Eucharist as the 'source and summit' of our faith. A high percentage of Catholics do not believe that Christ is truly present in the Eucharistic bread and wine we receive at

Communion. Too many receive the Eucharist without a second thought as to its significance. When the Eucharistic minister gives you the host, they say 'Body of Christ'. You answer 'Amen', which means you believe that the host once consecrated is the very body of Christ, not a wafer of bread, that you then receive. Each and every time you receive Communion remind yourself that Christ himself is entering you. This is profound and sanctifies you. Be Revived in the Eucharist!

## **Council Compass—Renewal**

Families of St. Patrick and St. Mary's:

With this issue of **Knight's Compass** we have entered the new fraternal year, starting July 1st. You will read of renewal and Revival in this issue. This year in the 3-year program of Eucharistic Revival focuses on the revival of the Parish in its focus on the

real presence of Christ in the Eucharist. We also celebrate the commemoration/renewal of our Country on July 4th.

Renewal begins with a look to purpose, and for the Knights of Columbus we see the mission to be to be threefold. First, is to "get the man right", which means to build a foundation in faith for all Catholic men. Some men, when they decide to join the knights, are already there, but the majority, and I include myself, before I became a Knight, are not there. To say the Knights have been transformational for me, would be an understatement.

If we 'get the man' right, it leads directly to the second part of our mission, "to get the family right". Families are struggling in so many ways in our culture which, it seems to me, is being systematically weakened, because there's not a devoted, faith-filled father to lead the family. While it is important for both father and mother to be active in their faith, it falls first on the father.

Finally, and the third point of mission is to "get the world right". The world will never be right if the first two are not first both right. The world has become a "me" world. It is the idea that what I think is right, that which helps me, is the mission. It is not! What did Christ say? Love your neighbor as yourself; not just love yourself.

So the mission follows, one point to the next: Get the man right, then you can get the family right, and get the world right. It's a mission that might seem impossible to achieve. It begins with each man. We do what we can locally, in our parish. The Knights of Columbus are here to renew each man to be a deeper follower of Christ, for themselves, their family, and the world. Be renewed, in Fraternity with Christ!

# **Compass of Council History**

continued from 50th Anniversary program in 1986 [published beginning with the Nov/Dec 2022, Vol 3, Issue 4 of **Knight's Compass**]

One of the Council's early star members and also its charter member was the late Conrad C. Ohman. He was selected as District Deputy, organized the Sauk City Black Hawk Council, organized first degree teams, and was a delegate to the Supreme Convention in 1941 at Atlantic City. Brother "Connie" and his wife "Hattie" were appointed as host and hostesses at the Tomah USO Center during World War II by the State Deputy. They worked tirelessly and gratuitously in arranging for chaperoning girl escorts, wives, daughters and sisters of Brother Knights who helped in entertaining military personnel at social functions at the USO Center. Another Council Brother and veteran of World War II, John Ensch, served as Chairman of the USO during the entire World War II keeping open house afternoons and evenings at the Legion Hall, arranging committees for luncheons, dinners and dancing parties for military service personnel from Camp McCoy and Volk Field. He also provided writing materials, books, magazines, etc. for the visiting servicemen.

At the fifteenth year anniversary banquet held on December 6, 1951, His Excellency Bishop Treacy delivered the principal address. He praised the Council for its sterling Catholicity. He also

Order for its splendid record of accomplishments in the past seventy years on behalf of the church and the state. His parting tribute was a request of his brother Knights to carry on with the same zeal and devotion as did Father McGivney and our founders. He ended by saying that he never had any fears for the

Several local organizations advertised in our 1986 50th Anniversary program booklet including David Hamm, now retired. David is a 50-year member of the Knights of Columbus as of April 1, 2023.

Church or the activity of a lay apostolate where an active Knights of Columbus Council was located. At this fifteenth anniversary banquet, Brother Marcel Pariseault, chairman Of the Catholic Activity Committee, on behalf of the Council presented His Excellency with a check to furnish a student's room at the new Holy Cross Seminary at La Crosse.

In January 1958, the Columbian Foundation was founded and incorporated for legal implications as the Council was considering purchasing a permanent home. In 1967 the Council bought the Rock Valley Rural School located on Highway 0 off Highway 58. The building was remodeled by Council members and dedicated on June 16,1968 with a Field Mass on the grounds. For several years a Field Mass was celebrated annually. The school has been abandoned because of breakdown of the water and disposal systems. The Council now meets in St. Patrick's Hall.

In addition to Connie Ohman's appointment as District Deputy, the following Brothers were also recognized: Brother John Ensch received the Dr. C. W. Henney Medalion Award for his meritorious service to his community, the Order, Church and state. Phil Quinn and "Nub" Hansen have been equally recognized with the award in separate later years. Other members who have served or are serving in the capacity of District Deputy include Phil Quinn, Maurice Comer, Florian Bindl, B. C. Johnson and A J. Karasch. B. C. Johnson was elected as State Warden one year and State Treasurer another year of the State Council.

#### **Compass Minutes—June 2023**

The June 20, 2023 council meeting began at 7:00 pm. Minutes of the May 16, 2023 meeting were approved with one correction, as they are re-published in the April/May/June issue of **Knight's Compass**. The amount of seed money for the Sportsmen's Raffle was corrected to \$1,000.

Elections were conducted. There was much discussion on the nominations before the election was held. Nominations from the floor included Tony Oldigs for Treasurer, Joe Buttner Jr for Warden, Tom Jodarski for Recorder, and Howard Boppart for Inside Guard. The full list of elected officers can be found on the back page of this issue of the newsletter.

Howard Boppart suggested we offer to help Fr. John with moving to his new assignment. The Treasurer's report indicated we have \$4040.04 in the general account and \$1,121 in the charities account. We made \$3,900 from the CPID (Tootsie Roll).

We introduced the new Knights of Columbus program called 'COR'. Cor is the Latin word for 'heart'. More details on the program are in the article following. We watched a 4 1/2 minute video introducing 'COR'. This is a program for all men in our parishes.

A motion was made, seconded and passed to reimburse the GK \$69.45 for a plaque to recognize Fr. John's contributions to our council. The Semi-Annual Audit will be conducted at our July Council meeting. Prayers for Jim Kolba and Bishop Callahan's continued recovery. A prayer to St. Isidore for farmers was the closing prayer. The meeting ended at 7:46 pm.

#### The 'Cor' of Knights

Adopted from multiple sources

When Blessed Michael McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus in the basement of St. Mary's Church, he desired that his group of men would support each other spiritually as well as give aid when their families were in need. In 1900, upon a gathering of Knights and their families to honor our founder, Fr. J.H. O'Donnell stated that, "... it was Father McGivney's purpose in instituting the Knights of Columbus, to keep the young men of his parish within the household of faith, to preserve them from the taint of infidelity, .... It was his aim to surround his protégés with an atmosphere of religion and to bring them into even closer relationship to Mother Church." This mission, begun in the 19th century, is needed even more now in the 21st century. This is why, under the direction of Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly, the Knights of Columbus is beginning the Cor Meeting ministry across the country.

The purpose of the Cor Meeting is to gather all men in the parish for prayer, formation, and fraternity. Its design is to invite men in the parish to learn more about the Cor Meeting and how we can meet the need to evangelize all men of our parishes. Fewer young people are coming to Mass and even believing in God. So many of our young men, who were raised in Catholic homes, no longer practice their faith. Those who do, wish to connect with other men in prayer and fraternity. Still others are moving into their twenties and thirties, and recognizing that they know very little about their faith. Local councils, by offering a Cor Meeting, will support the Church's mission to evangelize men into a greater fellowship with Jesus and His Church. You may be wondering, "What will this Cor Meeting look like?" Ideally, once a month men will gather for prayer, formation, and fraternity. These one-hour gatherings would be open to all men in the parishes connected to a council. One month, the focus might be on prayer, and the men could gather in Eucharistic Adoration during which a Rosary would be prayed. The next Cor Meeting might be focused on formation, and so the council could gather men from the parish to watch an episode of "Into the Breach" and discuss the message. A third meeting might be a time for social connections with pizza and beer being shared along with good conversation. All three elements can be addressed during each Cor Meeting (fraternity, formation, and prayer) with one element being the primary focus of each session.

Why are the Knights of Columbus beginning this new evangelization initiative at this time? We live in an age of evangelization where we, as faithful Knights of Columbus who support the mission of Holy Mother Church, are sent to evangelize. By inviting all men of our parishes to the Cor Meetings, the Knights of Columbus seeks to form men of every age and accompany them into a deeper relationship with Jesus and His Church. We know that many young men desire prayerful fellowship, and as Knights we desire to offer this for them and all men in the parish.

The district deputies learned about the Cor meeting initiative during their summer meeting in June 2023 and will be connecting with their councils' grand knights to provide more details.

#### 4th Watch of the (K)night

In this issue we introduce a new column of the newsletter directed to the Patriotic mission of the Knights of Columbus and therefore the 4th degree of the Order.

If you serve and trust in God, you can serve Country better. Here's a small primer on the 4th degree of the Knights.

Each 'degree' of the Knights of Columbus is

associated with a particular virtue, the fourth being "Patriotism". Consequently, the 4th Degree is often known as 'The Patriotic Degree'. It was established in New York on February 22, 1900. The requirements for joining the 4th are that a brother Knight must be a third degree member in good standing, be an exemplary Catholic, and be of sound citizenship of his country. Notice it says "citizenship of his country", not necessarily be a United States Citizen.

The Fourth Degree is frequently regarded as an honorary title but should rather be thought of in terms of service to church and country. The goals of the Fourth Degree may be summarized as the promotion of the ideals of Catholicism and Patriotism side by side.

In more detail, these goals may be stated as:

- ◆ To promote and strengthen the patriotic spirit of the civic community.
- ♦ To educate its members, and others, both in the teachings of Holy Mother Church, and the history of our nation.
- ◆ To promote by example the highest type of citizenship so necessary for the preservation and perpetuation of a republican form of government, and its democratic institutions.
- ◆ •To oppose dissemination and spread of doctrine dangerous to our form of government, and to the Divine law of faith and morality.

 To support by word and deed, the duly constituted authorities of local, state and

national government, and to recognize excellence in public life. Therefore, it is not unusual to find Fourth Degree Knights participating

visibly in church events, such as Eucharistic processions, and other church events, and in the community, standing up for the unborn and the elderly at Pro-Life events, and commemorating the sacrifices of the military for current and previous generations.

The primary purpose of the Fourth Degree is to foster the spirit of patriotism by promoting responsible citizenship and a love of, and loyalty to, the Knights' respective countries through active membership in local Fourth Degree groups called assemblies.

Our council belongs to the Fr. Francis Heindl Assembly 1902 based out of Tomah.

#### **Patriotic Honor Guard**

The Fourth Degree of the Knights of Columbus was established in 1900, a time when many Americans thought it was impossible for Catholics to be loyal citizens. Adding



patriotism to its foundational principles, the Order sought to encourage its members to engage in civic and political life, and demonstrate that love of God and love of country go hand in hand. "That nation is fortunate which possesses the Catholic type of political man," said Past Supreme

Knight John Cone. "Its destinies are in progressive, as well as wise hands, its morals are safe and its stability is assured."



#### **Principled Patriotism**

More than 360,000 Knights around the world have committed themselves to the Order's fourth principle of patriotism. Last fall, 136 men joined them during the first ever Fourth Degree exemplification aboard a U.S. Navy battleship. To see the video go to:
