## MERRY CHRISTMAS!!

The liturgical season of Christmas begins with the vigil Masses on Christmas Eve and concludes on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord (January 10<sup>th</sup>). During this season, we celebrate the birth of Christ into our world and into our hearts, and reflect on the gift of salvation that is born with him...including the fact that he was born to die for us. Here are some ways that we can celebrate the Christmas season for a few weeks longer:

- **Saint Stephen (the first martyr of the church) is the patron saint of bricklayers and stonemasons and his feast day is December 26<sup>th</sup>.** St. Stephen was one of the first 'social workers' in the Church, and it was his task to organize meals to feed the poor. In some homes and communities a box is labeled and set beside the Christmas tree. Members of the family, in gratitude for their Christmas blessings, choose one of their gifts for the "St. Stephen's Box" — clothing and other useful articles which are donated to the poor or to a mission country.
- **Saint John the Evangelist is the patron saint of love, loyalty, friendships, and authors and his feast day is December 27.** As a family eat a fish dinner and remember that John and his brother, James, were Galilean fishermen, and called the "sons of thunder". John and his community of followers are credited with writing the fourth Gospel.
- **The Feast of the Holy Family is the Sunday following Christmas (this year it is December 27<sup>th</sup> so Saint John will get bumped ☺)** Use this as a time to celebrate your own family. Make a cake and celebrate date of your wedding anniversary as the "birthday" of your family. This might also be a good time to consecrate your family to the Holy Family. <https://teachingcatholickids.com/consecrate-your-family-to-the-holy-family/>
- We reflect on **The Holy Innocents on December 28<sup>th</sup>.** They were the children under the age of 2 who were slaughtered by the tyrant Herod because he feared one of them might be the newborn rival king (Jesus). Today would be a good day to pray for all who have been affected by abortion. That they may find healing through places like Rachel's Vineyard, a safe place to renew, rebuild and redeem hearts broken by abortion. <https://www.rachelsvineyard.org/>
- **The Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God, and the Church's World Day of Peace is on January 1.** Celebrate the Solemnity of Mary and the Octave of Christmas by attending Mass. The vigil Mass will be offered here on December 31<sup>st</sup> at 5pm (also happens to be Father John's birthday) and Mass on January 1<sup>st</sup> will be at Noon.
- On **the Feast of the Epiphany (January 3<sup>rd</sup> of this year)** tradition calls for us to bless our homes because of the Biblical reference to the three kings entering the home where the Holy Family was staying in order to worship the Christ child there. Using blessed chalk to write the letters C, M, and B, plus the year, above the main entrance to the home (or above the door to each room in the house), like so: 20 + C + M + B + 21. The letters are the initials of the traditional names of the three magi: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. They also represent the Latin words *Christus mansionem benedicat*, which means: "May Christ bless the house." Of course, the + represents the cross.
- **On the Feast of the Baptism of our Lord (celebrated January 10<sup>th</sup> of this year)** discuss your family's Baptisms over a 12 days of Christmas themed feast found at <https://catholiccuisine.blogspot.com/2013/01/a-twelve-days-of-christmas-dinner-party.html>. The menu includes Four Calling Birds Chicken Wings and Six Geese-a-Laying Deviled Eggs.

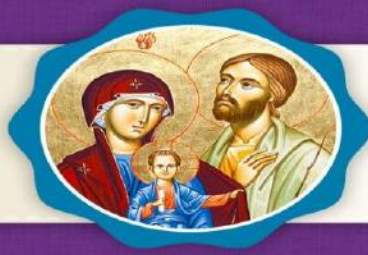
So remember if stores can start Christmassing in October, then you're entitled to celebrate the *real* Christmas season in its fullness!!
